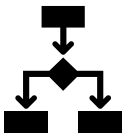

7. Communication

8. Evaluation



Students are responsible for material covered in lectures as well as the assigned readings. Activities, discussion questions, and question sets are completed during class time. Each activity is worth 1% of the course grade, each discussion question is worth 0.5% of the course grade, and each question set is worth 0.5% of the course grade. Detailed information about the assignment will be provided early in the semester. Quizzes are map-based. The midterm test will cover material studied from Sep 9 through Oct 21. The final exam is cumulative but weighted toward material studied in the second half of the semester. The test and exam will consist of multiple choice, true or false, fill in the blank, short answer, or map-based questions.

Requirements

Students missing course work for medical, compassionate or extenuating circumstances can request academic consideration by completing a request through the central academic consideration portal. Students are permitted one academic consideration request per course per term without supporting documentation. Note that supporting documentation is always required for the final exam.

Missed lecture notes are not sent out by e-mail. It is the student's responsibility to obtain any missed lecture notes from a classmate.

General Information about Missed Work

University policy requires that all requests for academic considerations must be accompanied by a self-attestation on the Student Absence Portal within 48 hours. Any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course outline. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the [Student Medical Certificate](#) or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Course Assessment that Requires Supporting Documentation (Midterm Test)

The midterm test has been designated as an assessment that requires formal documentation because it is considered central to the learning objectives for this course. Students seeking academic consideration for the midterm test will be required to provide formal supporting documentation to their Faculty of Registration. If academic consideration for the midterm test is granted, then a make-up midterm test will be scheduled. If a student is unable to attend the make-up midterm test at the scheduled time for a valid reason, then its weight will be transferred to the final exam.

Course Assessment with a Flexible Deadline (Assignment)

The assignment has a flexible deadline. Students are expected to submit the assignment by the deadline listed on the course outline. Should illness or extenuating circumstances arise, students are permitted to submit the assignment up to 48 hours past the deadline without academic penalty. Should an assignment be submitted beyond 48 hours past the deadline, a late penalty of 10% per day will be subtracted from the assessed grade. Since a flexible deadline is used for the assignment, requests for academic consideration for the assignment will not be granted. If you have a long-term academic consideration or an accommodation for disability that allows greater flexibility than provided here, you must notify the instructor at least one week prior to the deadline listed on the course outline.

Accommodation for Religious Holidays

Students should review the policy for [Accommodation for Religious Holidays](#). Where a student will be unable to write an exam due to a conflicting religious holiday, they should inform the instructor as soon as possible but not later than two weeks prior to writing the final exam. In the case of conflict with a midterm test, students should inform the instructor as soon as possible but not later than one week prior.

10. Make-up Tests and Exams

Procedure on make-up assessments for courses in the Faculty of Social Science:

Students who miss a regularly scheduled test or exam may request academic consideration through the [Student Absence Portal](#).

If academic consideration is granted, a make-up test or exam will be scheduled. Students are entitled to **one make-up assessment opportunity** supported by approved academic consideration. **No additional make-up opportunities will be provided.** Make-up assessments represent the final opportunity to complete a missed test or exam.

Students who miss a make-up assessment are not eligible for an additional make-up opportunity. Depending on circumstances, they may:

1. Remain enrolled in the course and consult with the course outline to calculate whether they can still achieve a passing grade in the course.
2. Withdraw from the course through Student Centre before the published drop deadline (e.g., for a missed make-up midterm test). A course dropped before the deadline will result in a withdrawal (WDN) without academic penalty. Part-time students should consult the Registrar's Office refund schedule to determine whether a tuition refund is available. Students enrolled full time in 4.0 to 5.0 courses are generally not eligible for tuition refunds when a course is dropped.

3. If the published drop deadline has passed (e.g., for a missed final exam) and the missed make-up assessment is supported by appropriate documentation, students may submit their documentation through the Student Absence Portal to request a WDN (withdrawal without academic penalty). Approval is not automatic and remains subject to Faculty review. Requests for a second make-up exam will not be considered.

Students are encouraged to carefully consider their ability to complete a make-up assessment as scheduled, as no further opportunities to complete the missed work will be available.

11. Academic Offences

Scholastic offences are taken seriously and students are directed to read the appropriate policy, specifically, the definition of what constitutes a [scholastic offence](#).

For activities that are completed in pairs, each student must write their own identifying information (name, student number, and signature). Writing someone else's identifying information is an offence; any student who has been found to have done this will receive a grade of zero on the assessment.

12. Use of Electronic Devices

No electronic devices will be permitted during the quizzes, test, or exam.

13. Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI)

The use of AI to aid in completing any assessment is not permitted in this course.

Representing an idea, an expression of an idea, or a writing style or structure that was generated by artificial intelligence will be considered an offence.
