Calendar Description: A critical review of Canadian research on environment and health, focusing upon dilemmas and responsibilities of conducting research in communities under stress. An opportunity for students to compare findings and re-consider methods for the particular contexts of research amongst vulnerable populations. **Prerequisite(s):** Fourth year status at the University and Geography 3250A/B or the former 2250A/B; or, permission of the instructor.

Course Syllabus

- - to prepare upper year students to conduct independent research in vulnerable communities;
- including background reading in the article and monograph literature on research protocols, ethics approval and interviewing techniques to prepare the researcher and the community to work together effectively to gather information and analyze that information to address meaningful questions. These assignments will include an interview questionnaire and a summary of the goals of the research; and a plan for engaging the community to participate meaningfully in the project with assurances of appropriate reciprocation for community participants
- -weekly attendance and preparation of the required readings and assignments including travel with the class to specified research sites
- -presentation of a short report on findings including analysis of what additional research and community work would be required to effect a successful relationship with an outcome useful and acceptable to the community participants
