Calendar Description: An examination of the spatial behavior of large corporations and the impact on regional economics. Investment pattern, interorganizational linkages and organizational change will be discussed.

Course objectives: This course provides a student with a basic understanding of the role of transnational corporations and nation-states in international business. The ability to critically evaluate world business patterns is the major objective of the course.

Course Requirements:

A group project to be done on a topics relevant to the course material listed in the above syllabus. The topic shall be agreed upon by the group and the course instructor. In all cases, the instructor's decision on appropriateness of a topic shall be final. In lieu of a topic selection by a group, a topic shall be assigned by the instructor. All topics must be approved by Feb 5.

Each group shall consist of 4instructor selected class members. The presentation is to consist of a scripted Power Point presentation suitable for posting on the course website. If a group wishes to undertaken a more difficult approach please consult with the instructor before starting.

Due dates will be staggered across the period Mar 3, Mar 10, Mar 17, Mar 24 and Mar 31. Due dates will be assigned to groups based on random assignment..

There in no final examination for this course.

Marking scheme:

1) Proficiency quizzes: 75% of the final mark. The top 5 of the 6 quizzes are worth 13.5% each of the final mark. The lowest quiz is worth 7.5%. **Quizzes will not be reevaluated after 2 weeks from the date the quiz was given.** Quizzes will be short answer or multiple choice. Quizzes may include material from previous lectures already tested with previous quizzes and any posted presentations.

2) Power Point script and presentation file: 25%
