Overview

This course examines environmental change over both short and long periods of earth history, considering both physical and human processes. An integrative approach (which combines physical and social science perspectives) provides a basis for understanding some of the world's most pressing environment and development challenges, such as climate change, biodiversity loss, fossil energy consumption, and persistent hunger and malnourishment.

Format

This course is based upon lectures, readings, and 5 tutorials/short written assignments. You will find it helpful, and get more out of each lecture, if you keep up with the reading assignments for each unit, which are posted on OWL (the PowerPoints for each lecture will be posted after class). The course will follow the thematic outline below, but the schedule is subject to some flexibility.

Note on Exams

Both the mid-term test and the final exam are a combination of multiple choice and paragraph written answers, and will cover the content in course lectures, seminars, and readings. If you fail to write the mid-term test or the final on the scheduled date and time, you will be given zero, unless you communicate and receive permission from the instructor *prior* to the exam, in which case you will require a note from your physician (see note on special examination policy below).

Note on Labs and Written Assignments

You are expected to attend all of the tutorial sessions in the time-slot assigned on your schedule, and only under special circumstances can you arrange to attend a different time. Tutorials involve short written assignments which are due precisely 2 weeks later, in your next tutorial. Unless you communicate and receive permission from your lab instructor, missed assignments will be given a 0, and late assignments will be deducted a 10% penalty for each day late.

Additional Information

Western's Special Examination Policy

A special examination is any examination other than the regularly scheduled exam. <u>Special exams will be allowed only on receipt of medical documentation verifying a serious illness that kept the student from writing the exam as originally scheduled.</u> Such documentation is strictly confidential and kept in the student's file. In the case of missing a final exam for documented medical reasons, a special exam will be set within 30 days.

Special exams will not be granted for occasions such as employment interviews, weddings, bar mitzvahs, family reunions, vacations, misreading an exam timetable, or oversleeping. Neither will special exams be granted in order to facilitate transportation arrangements, such as booking flights for home or holidays. It is the policy to discourage informal arrangements by faculty which circumvent this regulation. Students seeking academic accommodation on medical grounds for missed exams must apply to the Academic Counselling office of their home Faculty and provide documentation. Academic accommodation cannot be granted by the instructor or department.

Use of Electronic Devices

No electronic devices are allowed during tests.

Academic Offences

Plagiarism – Students must write their assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea, or a passage from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes and citations. Plagiarism is a major academic offence (see Scholastic Offence Policy in the Academic Calendar).

Final Marks
