

# 2. Calendar Description



## Requirements

Students must complete at least 3 assignments to pass the course. Students must earn a passing grade on the essay to pass the course.

#### **Late Assessments**

Assignments submitted late without approved documentation will be subject to a penalty of 10% per day. However, an assignment cannot be submitted after it has been graded and returned to the class.

#### 9. Accommodation Policies

#### **Accessible Education**

#### **Academic Consideration for Missed Assessments**

# 10. Make-up Examinations

A make-up exam will be granted with approved documentation only. All documentation for missed exams must be provided to an Academic Counselling Office within 48 hours of the originally scheduled exam and students must notify the instructor of the absence within 48 hours of the originally scheduled exam. Otherwise, a grade of zero on the exam will be assigned. The content of make-up exams will differ from the originally scheduled exam. There is no make-up for the midterm exam; if it is missed for a valid reason then the weight of it will be transferred to the final exam.

## 11. Academic Offences

Scholastic offences are taken seriously and students are directed to read the appropriate policy, specifically, the definition of what constitutes a <u>scholastic offence</u>.

The course essay is subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the university for the detection of

plagiarism. All essays submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com.
