2. Calendar Description

A survey of the methods and models used to understand human responses to hazards. The course reviews the rich tradition of hazards research in geography, particularly through the lens of social science. The course will include discussion of both natural hazards and technological hazards as examples.

- an introduction to social science theories of hazard responses
- recognition of the risks caused by hazardous events
- knowledge of hazard planning and management solutions

7. Communication



Students should check the course website regularly to keep up with announcements. E-mails to the instructor or to a teaching assistant must be sent from a UWO account and should contain the course code in the subject. E-mails will receive a response within 24 hours on weekdays.

8. Evaluation



Students are responsible for material covered in lectures as well as readings and videos. Assignments and question sets are practical, interactive applications of course content and will be completed during class time. Each assignment is worth 2% of the course grade except for discussion-based assignments (which are worth 1%). Detailed information about the essay will be provided early in the semester. The midterm exam will cover material studied from Sep 11 through Oct 16. The final exam is cumulative but heavily weighted toward material studied in the second half of the semester. Exams will consist of multiple choice, fill in the blank, and short answer questions.

Requirements

Late Assessments

Essays submitted late without approved documentation will be subject to a penalty of 10% per day.

9. Accommodation Policies

Academic Consideration for Missed Assessments

Students seeking academic accommodation on medical grounds for missed *assignments* or missed *question sets* should contact the instructor within 48 hours of the assessment deadline.

The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet their academic responsibilities may, on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. The University further recognizes that medical situations are deeply personal and respects the need for privacy and confidentiality in these matters. However, to ensure fairness and consistency for all students, academic accommodation for the *essay*, the *midterm exam*, or the *final exam* shall only be granted in those cases where there is documentation indicating that the student was seriously affected by illness and could not reasonably be expected to meet their academic responsibilities. This documentation must be submitted to an academic counselling office within 48 hours of the assessment deadline.

10. Make-up Examinations

A make-up exam will only be granted with approval from an Academic Counselling Office. All documentation for missed exams must be provided to counselling within 48 hours of the originally scheduled exam <u>and</u> students must notify the instructor of the absence within 48 hours of the originally scheduled exam. Otherwise, a grade of zero on the exam will be assigned. The content of make-up exams will differ from the originally scheduled exam. If a student is absent from both the midterm exam and its make-up exam for approved reasons, then the weight of the midterm exam will be transferred to the final exam.

11. Academic Offences

Scholastic offences are taken seriously and students are directed to read the appropriate policy, specifically, the definition of what constitutes a <u>scholastic offence</u>.

The use of artificial intelligence tools including ChatGPT is not permitted in the essay or the assignments. Representing an idea or expression of an idea that was generated by artificial intelligence will be considered an offence.

The essay is subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the university for the detection of plagiarism. All essays submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com.

For assignments that are completed in pairs, each student must write their own identifying information (name, student number, and signature). Writing someone else's identifying information is an offence; any student who has been found to have done this will receive a grade of zero on the assessment.

Computer graded multiple choice exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

No electronic devices will be permitted during exams.
