7. Communication

8. Evaluation



Students are responsible for material covered in lectures as well as the assigned readings. Activities, discussion questions, and question sets are completed during class time. Each activity is worth 1% of the course grade, each discussion question is worth 0.5% of the course grade, and each question set is worth 0.5% of the course grade. Detailed information about the assignment will be provided early in the semester. Quizzes are map-based. The midterm exam will cover material studied from Sep 11 through Oct 9. The final exam is cumulative but weighted toward material studied in the second half of the semester. Exams will consist of multiple choice, true or false, fill in the blank, short answer, or map-based questions.

Requirements

9. Accommodation Policies

Absence from Course Commitments

Students are permitted one academic consideration request per course per term without supporting documentation. Note that supporting documentation is <u>always</u> required for the final exam.

General Information about Missed Work

University policy requires that all requests for academic considerations must be accompanied by a self-attestation. Any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course outline. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the Student Medical Certificate or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Course Assessment that Requires Supporting Documentation (Midterm Exam)

The midterm exam has been designated as an assessment that requires formal documentation because it is considered central to the learning objectives for this course. Students seeking academic consideration for the midterm exam will be required to provide formal supporting documentation to their Faculty of Registration. If academic consideration for the midterm exam is granted, then a make-up midterm exam will be scheduled. If a student is unable to attend the make-up midterm exam at the scheduled time for a valid reason, then its weight will be transferred to the final exam.

Course Assessment with a Flexible Deadline (Assignment)

The assignment has a flexible deadline. Students are expected to submit the assignment by the deadline listed on the course outline. Should illness or extenuating circumstances arise, students are permitted to submit the report up to 48 hours past the deadline without academic penalty. Should an assignment be submitted beyond 48 hours past the

deadline, a late penalty of 10% per day will be subtracted from the assessed grade. Since a flexible deadline is used for the assignment, requests for academic consideration for the assignment will not be granted. If you have a long-term academic consideration or an accommodation for disability that allows greater flexibility than provided here, you must notify the instructor at least one week prior to the deadline listed on the course outline.

Accommodation for Religious Holidays

Students should review the policy for <u>Accommodation for Religious Holidays</u>. Where a student will be unable to write an exam due to a conflicting religious holiday, they should inform the instructor as soon as possible but not later than two weeks prior to writing the final exam. In the case of conflict with a midterm exam, students should inform the instructor as soon as possible but not later than one week prior.

10. Make-up Final Examinations

A special final exam is any exam other than the regular exam, and it may be offered only with the permission of the Dean of the Faculty in which the student is registered in consultation with the Instructor and Department Chair. Permission to write a special final exam may be given based on compassionate or medical grounds with appropriate supporting documents. The format and content of make-up exams may differ substantially from the original exam.

11. Academic Offences

Scholastic offences are taken seriously and students are directed to read the appropriate policy, specifically, the definition of what constitutes a <u>scholastic offence</u>.

The use of artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT or artificial intelligence writing assistants is not permitted in the discussion questions or the assignment. Representing an idea, an expression of an idea, or a writing style or structure that was generated by artificial intelligence will be considered an offence.

For activities that are completed in pairs, each student must write their own identifying information (name, student number, and signature). Writing someone else's identifying information is an offence; any student who has been found to have done this will receive a grade of zero on the assessment.

Computer graded multiple choice exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

No electronic devices will be permitted during quizzes or exams.
